## President's Page

The United States Constitution was enacted September 17, 1787. It is a short but remarkable document that has given rise to the most powerful country on the planet. The United States of America is a country with great freedom for all citizens. The Constitution established our three branches of government – judicial, executive and legislative. The branches, while separate, are designed as a means to keep the others in check.

Article II gave the executive, the President, several powers, including the power to appoint federal judges. Article III, section 1 of the Constitution states in part:

The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish.

Article III, section 2, was critical in the landmark decision *Marbury vs. Madison* which set the precedent for Supreme Court judicial review as to the constitutionality of legislation. Specifically, the language of Article III that Chief Justice John Marshall cited in his opinion was:

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Case before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

President John Adams, a Federalist, was defeated by Thomas Jefferson for the presidency. As a lame duck, John Adams appointed several Federalist judges to the bench. The procedure involved the presidential appointment and then a commission delivered by the Secretary of State to the appointee. Some commissions were delivered to the Federalist appointees prior to Jefferson taking office. But, transportation in the 18th century was slower than the 21st century, thus some commissions, including William Marbury's, were not delivered to the Federalist appointees prior to Jefferson taking office.

When Jefferson came into office, he refused to authorize the Secretary of State, then James Madison (the Defendant in *Marbury vs. Madison*), to deliver the commission to Federalist judge appointee William Marbury. Marbury filed suit. In a brilliant opinion, Chief Justice John Marshall reviewed the pertinent law, applied the facts to the law, and examined the Constitution.

The issues presented included whether Marbury had a right to sue, whether his lawsuit with the Supreme Court was the right place of his suit and, if so, did he had an available remedy. The Constitution vested the executive branch with the authority to appoint judges, Chief Justice John Marshall held that indeed Marbury had a protectable right and by virtue of Article III authority given to the United States Supreme Court, Marbury had filed suit in the right forum. The question was whether the remedy Marbury sought, a mandamus issued by the Supreme Court requiring the Secretary of State to deliver the commission as authorized under the Judiciary Act of 1789, was constitutional. Specifically, the Judiciary Act of 1789 empowered the Supreme Court:

...to issue writs of mandamus, in cases warranted by the principles and usages of law, to any courts appointed, or persons holding office, under the authority of the United States.

The court held the above cited language of the Judiciary Act of 1789, compelling the Supreme Court to issue a mandamus against the Secretary of State to deliver the commission, was unconstitutional because it exceeded the power granted to the Supreme Court in the Constitution. William Marbury never did obtain his judgeship, but this is of little significance. The case is important because it established the fundamental foundation of our system of judicial review making the judicial branch equal in power to the legislative and executive branches. Specifically, Chief Justice John Marshall wrote

It is emphatically the province and duty of the Judicial Department to say what the law is. Those who apply the rule to particular cases must, of necessity, expound and interpret that rule. If two laws conflict with each other, the Courts must decide on the operation of each. So, if a law be in opposition to the Constitution, if both the law and the Constitution apply to a particular case, so that the Court must either decide that case conformably to the law, disregarding the Constitution, or conformably to the Constitution, disregarding the law, the Court must determine which of these conflicting rules governs the case. This is of the very essence of judicial duty. If, then, the Courts are to regard the Constitution, and the Constitution is superior to any ordinary act of the Legislature, the Constitution, and not such ordinary act, must govern the case to which they both apply.

Judicial review as established and articulated by Justice John Marshall is a fundamental foundation of our society. In part, because of it, we live in a civil free society with checks and balances. We do not live in a dictatorship, such as North Korea, Iran or Libya. We lawyers have a duty to make sure that we protect the system and protect the rights of the citizenry.

It is also a great honor for all of us to have a license to practice law whether we argue a famous case such as *Marbury vs. Madison* or a simple arbitration case involving breach of contract. ## Proposed By-Laws Amendment

On April 19, 2011, the Board of Governors of the McHenry County Bar Association approved the following amendment to the McHenry County Bar Association By-Laws. This announcement fulfills the requirement of the By-Laws that the MCBA membership be notified of any proposed changes 30-days prior to the final vote at the Annual Meeting.

Pursuant to Article X AMENDMENTS, Section 10.01, 2, the Board of Directors propose that the By-Laws be amended in the following manner:

Article II MEMBERSHIP, Section 2.04 B shall be amended to state "ASSOCIATE MEMBERS. Any person having received an appropriate certificate of completion of an ABA approved paralegal program or any student currently enrolled in an ABA accredited law school."

Article II MEMBERSHIP Section 2.06 shall be amended to read "PRIVILEGES. All members in good standing shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of membership, except that associate members shall have a voice, but not a vote, at the meetings of the Association and any Section thereof, nor shall they be entitled to hold office, or any Section office, or serve on the Board of Governors. An affiliate member shall not be counted toward any quorum."

Article II MEMBERSHIP Section 2.09 C shall be amended to read "SPECIAL. Special meetings shall be called by the Secretary, in writing to each member of the Association. A special meeting may be requested by the President or by ten (10) or more active or life members of the Association. Such request and notice shall specify the purpose of the meeting. At special meetings, no business shall be transacted except that which is stated in the request and notice."

Article VIII, Section 8.01 shall be amended to read "AMOUNT. The fiscal year shall begin and the new officers and Board of Governors shall take office on the first day of July in each year. The annual dues shall also be payable on that date unless a vote to change the dues is scheduled for the annual meeting, in which case dues shall be payable no later than July 31. Dues shall be set and/or changed in the manner and fashion provided for Amendment to the By-Laws except that there shall be no fee for law students or the first year of membership immediately following graduation from law school and paralegal associate members shall pay dues in an amount equivalent to 75% of the membership dues for an attorney."

# Family Division Update

Since I last authored a Family Division Update in the fall, many things have changed (or will soon change) in the Family Division to help improve efficiency in the Division, while many other things continue to be studied.

In the Spring of 2011, the Twenty-Second Circuit increased its judicial roster to seventeen. While the Circuit is behind many in terms of judicial resources, it is ahead of others and welcomes the new position (and more so, Judge Mark Gerhardt who has been initially assigned to the Criminal Division). The additional resource itself has been actually assigned to the Civil Division to help with an accrued backlog of foreclosure cases. However, to open at least a half day each week in the Division, child support cases commenced by the Illinois Department of Health and Human Services (represented by the Illinois Attorney General) have been reassigned to the newly created foreclosure call being heard in Courtroom 358 by Judge James Cowlin. This reassignment took effect April 25, 2011.

Through the end of May, 2011, on most Fridays, the Attorney General will continue to staff a call of child support cases commenced by the Department, along with other cases into which the Department has intervened. The cases into which the Department has intervened, will generally continue to be assigned to one of the Family dockets called in Courtrooms 359, 360, and 361. Such cases in Courtroom 360 will continue to be called at 8:30 a.m., in 361 at 9:00 a.m., and in 359 at 9:30 a.m. Thereafter, starting at 10:00 a.m., the child support cases commenced by the Department will generally be called in Courtroom 358. Contested matters will generally be specially set for Friday afternoons. To make this tight scheduling work, prompt handling of all such cases must occur.

Starting in June, 2011, on most Fridays, the Attorney General will continue to staff the call of such cases. The cases into which the Department has intervened, will generally continue to be assigned to one of the Family dockets called in Courtrooms 359, 360, and 361. However, such cases will generally be called starting at 8:30 a.m. in Courtroom 359 on the first Friday of each month, in 360 on the second Friday of each month, and in 361 on the third Friday of each month. Then, starting at 10:00 a.m. each Friday, the child support cases commenced by the Department will generally be called in Courtroom 358. Contested matters may be set as time allows each morning or Friday afternoons.

Through the reassignment of child support cases involving the Department, the Division will effectively open up a fair amount of time to handle other cases in the Division, with hopes of providing even greater efficiencies in handling cases. Cases which involve parenting issues (i.e., custody and visitation) will generally be reassigned away from the call in Courtroom 358 to the extent the same involve issues which cannot be handled in summary fashion (typically, by agreement). As well, under Illinois Supreme Court rule, certain cases commenced by the Department and involving parenting issues, will likely remain with the judge who has been handling the same.

To open up even more time to handle cases in the Division, an administrative order is being developed to utilize efficiencies being realized in the Criminal Division. The administrative order which is being developed was not available at the time this article was due (and past due with the indulgence of the publisher), but will likely be effective June 1, 2011. Starting then, the pending plan is designed to have all prove-ups of pending dissolution petitions heard in Courtroom 102 each day of the week the Court is in session (Monday through Friday) at 1:30 p.m. Judge Robert Wilbrandt will generally cover these prove-ups, with a day or two perhaps involving a bit of temporary reassignment at the outset, as a call or two gets redirected. Any such temporary reassignment will likely occur at the same time in a courtroom on the first floor of the courthouse and will be posted on the door to Courtroom 102. Such prove-ups will likely start promptly at 1:30 p.m. and end promptly at or about 2:30 p.m. when other matters will likely be called for hearing by the judge handling the call.

Further, to open up even more time, starting June 1, 2011, the pending plan is designed to have returns on all independent emergency orders of protection and no contact orders heard in Courtroom 101 each day of the week the Court is in session (Monday through Friday) at 10:00 a.m. Judge Robert Beaderstadt will generally cover these hearings which will start once his morning call of criminal cases is concluded. Cases which involve parenting issues (i.e., custody and visitation) will generally be reassigned away from the call in Courtroom 101 to the extent the same involve issues which cannot be handled in summary fashion.

All of this change is good, and though not perfect, it will work to improve access to the judges handling family matters for the Court. As well, further change may arrive as the Court continues to study its operations and work toward further improvements.

Among other things, compliance with local rules is being studied. Most such rules are designed to assist the Court with limited time to handle contested matters, to move such matters toward a proper resolution, either by agreement or through trial. When local rules are not followed, the system which depends upon compliance stumbles, resulting in inefficiencies, delays, and other problems. For instance, on one day recently, one of our courtrooms had three specially set settlement conferences ("pre-trials") in three different cases which had been pending for about a year. Each party had counsel. None had the memorandum required under local rule prepared, and none had a financial affidavit on file. All three got postponed. An hour and a half of contested hearing time got wasted.

As always, the Court will continue to work to find ways to improve the handling of cases in the Circuit, and to such end, continues to welcome comment and suggestions for the same.
